- ** Why can't social services have all the money it needs while the Navy runs cake sales to launch its battle ships?
- ** Are feminists right when they accuse us of jumping in to volunteer as a bandaid response to needs rather than tackling the root cause of problems or legislative priorities?
- ** Do we, as volunteers, develop the same "turf" problems as everyone else? How ready are we to collaborate and share resources with similar organizations?
- ** Have we really made every effort to involve the broadest possible base of volunteers: minorities, teens and children, the disabled, the poor, etc.?
- ** Does each of us, personally, talk about our volunteer work to others we meet? Or are there colleagues at work, family members or friends who would be surprised to hear what we do in our "spare" time? (Start talking today!)
- ** Since volunteering is something people do above and beyond their regular jobs or other life commitments—in their leisure time—why don't we try to structure volunteering as recreation, instead of "work"?
- ** Do we remember that "amateur" means "love of" something? And do we also remember that "professional" says more about attitude and training than about salary?
- ** Why do we use so many four-letter words such as "just" or "only"?
- ** If you and I are still volunteers, and intend to remain volunteers, isn't it possible we are not alone? (Sure it is.)
