



Scriptural Secret ^{No}1.


Life is fluid; change is natural. It's also good – because it's God's way of bringing growth.

When it began to be evident that charitable organizations might raise funds via the Internet, many charities (Christian and non) were reluctant to go there. It was scary, or too risky, or too much work, or whatever. Many simply felt we were quite a number of years away from seeing any serious money travel into nonprofit organizations by way of the Internet. Those who fully understood its potential, however, were going crazy.

David M. Lawson, president of the Prospect Information Network and a specialist in raising money for colleges, declared in the Chronicle of Higher Education: "We are artificially suppressing the amount of money that could be raised. We are in a Niagara Falls of money ... I want to pull my hair out. Get a bucket, and get under there."

Bush says...Volunteer America!



This year President Bush, in his State of the Union address, called all Americans to give at least two years in their lifetime, the equivalent of 4,000 hours, to the service of others. This is of particular interest to faith-based organizations who have been working hard over the years to help those less fortunate.

Enthusiasm in volunteerism is rapidly spreading across the US ever since Bush declared a National Volunteer Week to celebrate the volunteer activities of Americans, since launching the USA Freedom Corp initiative to provide a tool to assist Americans volunteer, and since Bush's State of the Union address where he called Americans to volunteer.

The USA Freedom Corps web site (www.usafreedomcorps.gov) has been visited over 6 million times. The Citizen Corps web site has been visited more than 1.2 million times, with more than 18,000 volunteers signing up. More than 181,000 people have visited the Peace Corps web site, with an increase of 86 percent in web activity and a 56 percent (14,614 applications) increase in public interest. Since January, the AmeriCorps program received a 50 percent increase in applications and a 95 percent increase in web site traffic (4 million hits). Also, there is more interest in the Senior Corps program, with an increase of 527 percent since the State of the Union.

Bush says, "serving America doesn't have to go through USA

Freedom Corps, it's just an opportunity. You can serve America all kinds of ways. You can do so through a faith-based initiative.

"The faith community is a particularly rich source of volunteer strength in America. Government can rally a military, but it cannot put hope in our hearts or a sense of purpose in our lives."

Now is the time to provide the opportunity to help capture the spirit and desire of the American people and corporately lead them in volunteer action under a unified goal to achieve results.

President Bush called on the Senate to pass the CARE (Charity Aid, Recovery and Empowerment) Act and for Congress to send him a final bill to sign.


The Lieberman-Santorum CARE Act aims to leverage new support and resources for a broad range of community and faith-based organizations.

THE CHARGE

WESTOVER CHURCH in Greensboro, North Carolina is a place where volunteers are not really thought of as volunteers. They're not the people who pitch in every now and then to help out the community, or to drive the elderly to church on Sunday. Nor are they merely guests in the church office with only partial access to church programs and records. Westover is shaking things up a bit and altering church's function, and Pastor Chris Hardy is leading the way. He's spent the last year at Westover changing the perspective on how a successful church is operated and where volunteer staff fit into the big picture of global ministry.

Search for Significance

With an undergraduate degree in counseling psychology and a masters degree in counseling, Chris Hardy is as well prepared to be the Pastor of Equipping Ministries at Westover Church as anyone could be. Having always thought he would end up in a psychology-related field, over the years he's discovered that ministry work is his true calling, and closer to psychology than he thought.

In November of 1997, Hardy attended a Leadership Training Network conference on growing the church by releasing the laity, and it was here that he began to understand what his genuine passions were for serving the church.

"I went to the conference knowing that I was needing to do something different. Prior to the conference, I felt as though I was in a room that was dark—I couldn't see anything. This conference turned the lights on."

After the conference, Hardy was motivated to develop an equipping system for his church. "That's when I realized that seminary had not prepared me with the ability to work with people and equip them for transforming ministry."

He was asked to join the faculty of Leadership Training Network in 1998, which further prepared him for his future role at Westover. "I came on staff with them and started learning more about what it meant to release people and allow them to do their work."

Hardy was teaching a two-day seminar for Leadership Training Network on lay ministry in Richmond, Virginia and two search team members from Westover Church were there actively pursuing a pastor of gifts-based ministry. After the conference, these two people approached Hardy and asked if they could speak to him about the open position. Hardy prayed about the offer, but didn't call Westover back for several months. Finally, Hardy called them back after much prayer and said, "Let's just talk about the possibilities." "That's when God began to confirm in my heart that Westover was where I needed to be."

Making the Change

Hardy decided to make the move to Westover Church in March of 2000 and feels that it has been one of the decisions that has most influenced his life and helped to influence others. His core desire was now being fulfilled through the position of equipping pastor.

"Westover was already a place where they released people into ministry. They just needed the processes in place to make it work."

The whole idea of equipping is about the church providing personal, relational, Christ-centered growth for people through ministry service in the church. "It's about equipping, releasing, and empowering people to truly be God's hands in the world, in the community, and in the church."

This is the basis on which Westover's equipping ministry is built. Hardy feels that through his efforts, the equipping department helps to prepare, connect, and equip people to discover their gifts. One of the department's key roles is to take what they learn about people and match them in appropriate growth scenarios. They see providing people with meaningful growth opportunities as the only way to create successful ministry teams.

In order to help people discover what their passions and gifts are, Westover offers a "Discovery Class" for people that are interested in serving. This class is designed to help people learn how the church can serve them as well as how they can serve the church, by discovering their talents and gifts and how to best use them in church



for Faith-Based Organization \$avings

1 Buy Your Dumpster – Don't lease, buy. After an initial lump sum price of around 900 bucks. Savings will begin. Over time, less money will be going into the trash!

- **2** Ask for Prompt Payment Discounts from Your Vendors – Ever heard of 2% 10 Net 30? Ask for a 2% discount for payments made within 10 days and this will help you save quite a few dollars over the year. In addition, you reduce interest charged on your debts, saving you even more money.
- **3** Find Ways to Increase Efficiency and Reduce Redundancies – You can save time working with one company that bundles its products and services to serve your special needs. You can also save money by purchasing products from one company, because companies typically offer discounts to clients they have a strong relationship with.
- **4** Join a Wholesale Club A small investment in a membership fee at a wholesale club can mean big savings over the course of a year. 25% savings in groceries is just one example, along with paying less for items you repetitively purchase such as office supplies.
- **5 Review Energy Consumption** Then establish a conservation program to reduce costs, which can include educating every one of your members on how to save energy. For example, (a message that has been preached thousands of times) "Turn off the lights as you leave the room!"

- **9** Use Your Tax Exempt Status! Ensure that you have a tax-exempt certificate for your state and use it to avoid all sales taxes where applicable. Wow, have it laminated while you are at it..!
- **10** Invest in a Web Site Over time, you can use the medium as a venue for many of the materials you normally print, like the calendar of events and directories. Web sites are cheaper than printing costs over time.


and in the community. Hardy feels that "God has called the church to serve people." Through this class, people are asked to share their life stories, their testimonies, and what their strengths, interests, and desires are. This in turn aids the church in placing them in an opportunity that's a perfect fit.

"We help people discover who they are and what they need, we help them deepen in their relationship with Christ, we help with developing their gifts and abilities, then we proactively deploy them into ministry according to their giftedness." Hardy calls these the four "D's"—the core of equipping and the standards by which all efforts are measured. If the four "D's" are successful, then he feels equipping is successful.

"When introducing people into ministry, we try to get away from the word 'Volunteer'. We use the word 'Minister' as a whole. If people can make this distinction, it changes the way they view their service. It changes the way people see volunteerism—it's really ministry," said Hardy.

One church member, Paula Salmon, came to Hardy and wasn't sure how she wanted to serve. After meeting with her, Hardy found that she had a passion for scrapbooking and had gifts of service and craftsmanship. Her talents and desires turned






into a program called "Scrapbooking for Mothers," a program designed to help disadvantaged mothers make scrapbooks for their children. Each month, Paula and other women from Westover visit shelters in the Greensboro area. They buy scrapbooks and disposable cameras to take to the shelters for the women to take photos of their kids. Paula's ministry then develops the film and teaches the women how to design and create a scrapbook for their families. Her ministry provides gifts for disadvantaged women in ways that she never thought possible. One of the most influential classes Paula held was at Mary's house—a home for mothers who are recovering from addictions. "The fellowship we had while making the scrapbooks was amazing. I was able to connect with them on a special level. After the class was over, I was able to testify to them as a new Christian," said

Paula. "It was as meaningful for me as it was for them."

"All this came out of Paula learning about her gifts and passions. These women in the community are benefiting because one woman realized her gifts," Hardy noted.

Leading the Charge

One of the most critical aspects of managing and leading a group of ministry volunteers is ongoing training and leadership develop-

"We treat people as equals—it doesn't matter if ministers are paid or not. Westover pours our resources into people. In fact, we send many people to conferences who aren't paid because it's all about le," Hardy said.

people that serve. This undervalued person in ministry is an unhappy and unfulfilled person in ministry, and we want them to be fulfilled."

Because valuing people is Westover's most important goal, they are always looking for ways to increase value through the tools that the church uses. When Hardy joined Westover, he began investigating software programs that would help organize his equipping ministry.

Firewalls

Having a fast connection to the Internet is a very helpful thing. The Internet is a rich source of information, an efficient way to make purchases, and can provide valuable insights into new curriculum and mission opportunities. A growing number of individuals and churches have broadband connections which are "always on," such as cable modems and digital subscriber lines. While this doorway to the Internet can have many positive benefits, it also poses a risk.

As long as the connection to the Internet is "on" the computer network is at risk. Without any protection, not only can you access the Internet, but people on the Internet can also access your network. Fortunately, you can protect your system and your data using a firewall. A firewall allows you to access the Internet while preventing an intruder from accessing your data or interfering with your network. It filters all the packets of information that go in and out of your network, blocks the ones you do not want, and allows the ones you do to continue to their destination. Viruses, Trojan horse programs, and other damaging applications are stopped before they have a chance to do any damage.

A FIREWALL ALLOWS YOU TO ACCESS THE INTERNET WHILE PREVENTING AN INTRUDER FROM ACCESSING YOUR DATA OR INTERFERING WITH YOUR NETWORK.

The best news of all is that all this protection comes at a very reasonable price. Be sure you practice "safe computing" while surfing the Internet. Purchase and install a good firewall on your computer or network. ACS Professional Services (www.acstechnologies.com/services) would be glad to assist you in making your network secure. They talk about how meaningful the ministry has been to the participants and then give the congregation the opportunity to participate. Hardy feels that this increases the nonpaid ministers' feeling of importance and gives them a true sense of confidence about what they do.

Westover also has "Ministry Connectors," or people within every ministry in the church whose ministry is to take a person with passions and gifts and connect them to the ministry where there's a good fit. They facilitate a meeting with the ministry leader, answer questions they might have, and provide orientation. Many of these

"We've customized lists within Volunteer Manager and can sort ministries by passions, talents and skills, or spiritual gifts, and will soon be able to capture job descriptions and qualifications of our volunteers. Taking Computing into Our Communities

If you walk into the sanctuary of the Dorchester Temple Baptist Church, it would seem like many other churches throughout the country that use ACS software, but if you go into the basement of the church it would seem far from ordinary. That is because the basement houses three computer labs with a total of over 50 computers, all sharing a high-speed connection to the Internet. These computer labs are part of a service called the PREP Community Computer Center that the church offers to the local community and church members through free walk-in computer access and free computer classes to at-risk youth and unemployed adults.

One woman said, "I've went by this church every day for the past 12 years, and these computer classes were the first thing that got me through the door."

The PREP Community Computer Center started as a partnership of the Dorchester Temple Baptist Church and Cambridge Vineyard Christian Fellowship and Bruce Wall Ministries (BWM). In 1999, we started the program by sending out a bulk mailing to about 5,000 residents in the neighborhood about computer classes. We had our first computer classes in Microsoft Office, Graphic Design and Web Design. We continued to expand at "Internet growth rates" with the numbers in our classes almost doubling every semester for the next couple of years to where now we have over 600 students in classes each year. The number of volunteers grew just as rapidly as the number of students. We saw that once Christians realized that they could use their computer skills to serve God and others, large numbers of volunteers started to get involved. Now, the computer ministry in the Vineyard church involves over 30 volunteers each year, most of whom serve weekly, and we also have another 70 volunteers from over a dozen other local area churches. In addition, we now have four full-time staff in the program and six part-time staff. To maintain professional quality standards, the business is supervised by a Christian who is a former Intel employee.

We also offer a free walk-in computer lab with about 30 visitors each afternoon, a technology curriculum in BWM's after school program and a youth-run Web design business. This Web design business gives inner-city youth hands-on experience designing web sites for corporations and non-profit organizations.

One such individual is François, who lived in a low-income neighborhood of Boston and started taking classes when he was 16, having never used a computer before. After taking classes at PREP, François learned so quickly that we hired him to assist in computer lab supervision and in our youth-run Web design business. Through his continued hard work and PREP's discipleship program, François graduated high school and received a full-ride scholarship to U. Mass Amherst in Computer Science. Another individual is Marvina, who was an unemployed single parent living in Dorchester. She took our Excel class and after only one semester was able to score an 88% on an Excel test with a placement agency and was hired immediately after passing the test and now has been placed in a permanent position.

In addition to developing their skills, we also help develop the youth staff spiritually through regular discipleship and Bible study time. In our computer classes, we use more of a relational model of evangelism, which focuses on developing a relationship with someone to invite them into Christian community. We have had several of our students start attending church services because they came to our classes.

God has really blessed us with individuals who have benefited from our computer ministry. We believe that part of why God has been backing us is that He is developing a computer literacy movement involving Christians from across the world. As we researched more, we found Christians across the country were already joining the computer literacy movement. The reason for this seems to be that computers and the Internet have finally reached the point where small organizations like churches or community organizations can offer some of the same educational resources as major institutions. We now have over 250 Christian community computer centers on our list across the world.



Volunteer Ministry is an exciting topic that churches and ministries are currently pursuing in droves. Setting up a ministry for volunteers takes the pressure off each activity and provides a reliable base of volunteers from which to draw on in many situations. It also offers the members of your organization an opportunity for personal and spiritual growth in an organized fashion. At the same time, it is possible to save money and time for your ministry by developing a program that better utilizes volunteers.

Even though the idea of developing a volunteer base is not new, software tools are now making it less arduous to compile this information and organize it in a way that makes sense. Many organizations have lots of questions and much learning to do in order to effectively and efficiently implement a successful volunteer program. To get you off to a good start, compiled are a few tips to keep in mind while starting a volunteer ministry.

Seeking & Searching

Seek and ye shall find. When you are looking for people to fit into a particular position, there are a few great places to look first. Look where you are, which could be anywhere. Try youth ministries, singles ministries, and senior adult ministries; also, try looking on your knees!

Volunteer Qualities

To help create an environment for success, look for your next volunteer with qualities such as a team playing attitude, a positive outlook, a teachable mind frame, a confident state of mind, and dependable manner. Most of all, they need to be FLEXIBLE. Remember, however, that these qualities, if not all in each person may be developed over time.

Attitude & Approach

Get out of "crisis" mode. When you are searching for volunteers, take it easy and don't overwhelm people or make them feel guilty. Just let them know about the need without pressuring or manipulating them.

Assessment Tools

When you are selecting volunteers for specific positions, there are a few important factors to take into consideration. Try to determine a person's skills, gifts, and passions. Discriminate for spiritual gifts, personality style, abilities in general, and specific experience. You may get clues to these from well-crafted questions that you can use during the interview process. gifts, passions, and experience. You can then use the information to place specific volunteers in appropriate areas. You will find that this method helps encourage involvement by providing productive serving environments for its people.

Interviewing

People have a natural tendency to tell others what they want to hear. To ensure you get the right response in an interview setting, rephrase your question of "What would you do..." to "Tell me about a time when you had to...."

- 22.3% of people volunteered when not asked.
- 89.5% of people volunteered when asked.
- 49.1% were asked last year.

Matching

Like the popular child's toy where you insert plastic shapes into a sphere by matching the plastic piece to the similarly shaped hole, the same must be done for your volunteers. Focus on fulfilling people instead of just filling positions. Plug people in – where they fit!

Training

Ensure everyone in your volunteer ministry understands the "why" or "big picture" of their job. Make sure they are thoroughly trained and then delegate responsibility. This will see to it that there isn't confusion. Help them to see the Vision & Purpose. Keep goals clear.

Keeping Volunteers

Every volunteer you keep is one less you have to find. Every excited volunteer increases your recruiting ability. Demonstrate trust by following through with what you say you'll do. Give them affirmation. Give recognition for volunteers. Give small gifts for things done well and for general appreciation. In general...give.

Managing People

This is a tough one for many, but it doesn't have to be. Do your homework, plan and prepare. At all times be professional (which can still mean have fun!). Establish the freedom and structure to express complaints and make suggestions; feel free to learn from each other. Establish a system for accountability in which everyone is accountable to each other.

Managing Information

Keep an organized record of the information you gather from the interviews. Use a software program especially designed for Volunteer Ministry management to help you manage the information and the people.

These tips should help you in your search to quickly identify and match people with your predefined ministry opportunities. Keep in mind that you are searching for attributes like talents, spiritual

The extract type should be Comma Separated Value. Finally, use HotSync to export the data from Microsoft Outlook into your Palm Pilot.


